
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
Kids need more outside programs in Abbotsford . We need specialized teachers again for art, pe and music. Children today are having more mental health issues than ever b efore, we need to be teaching them different ways to cope by utilizing specialized teac hers in these areas. Pe isn't just about playing Tag or dodgeball and art isn't just colour ing a photo. We are missing a massive opportunity to support kids. Kids find connectio ns in these programs, pe gives kids skills to join sports teams, music gives kids opport unities to join bands, art gives opportunities to start group art projects ect, when kids ar e plugged into teams and groups of their interests children don't feel as alone. And the y have an outlet to release very real emotions. It's is a travesty that we are not giving ki ds quality education in these areas. And this is why so many people (who can afford it) choose privet or homeschooling. Because they have lost faith in the public schools to t each a well rounded education. In terms of growth, we have 5 years in advance to kn ow an approximate amount of kindergarten registrations. I'm not sure why we can utiliz e the birth rate in Abbotsford . Most people who give birth in a city(excluding complicati ons) stay in that city to raise their child. We need to hire more teachers and be a leadin g example in the province for small class sizes. Smaller schools shouldn't be punished because they have less students. Split classes are terrible and we need to encourage smaller class sizes so all students have an opportunity to grow.



With more and more developments on the horizon, I fear that these numbers are under estimated. More classrooms are needed, obviously, but we need to be able to safely an d successfully staff those classrooms. Teachers are burning out at an alarming rate and the children are not getting the care that they deserve. We're losing the "extras" that sh ould be mandatory in the curriculum, such as arts teachers and proper PE teachers. The district programs need to get back on track and shouldn't get funding solely based on enrollment, therefore forcing them to take students that don't actually have an interest in the program, therefore losing the vision of those programs. The arts school doesn't even have music or dance teachers, so how is it called an arts school? If the federal and provincial governments are forcing densification on our city, the funding that they are of fering to support that needs to include the infrastructure required for a higher populace, and education and its facilities need to be higher on that list.

This! I don't know what school you're from, my it happens at my child's school as well a nd is completely ruining her experience, nevermind the fact of how unsafe she feels.


